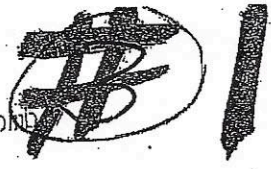

- #1 through #4. Fur and hair from victim.
- #9. Swab from ice chest in suspect's vehicle.
- #10 and #11. Hair from ice chest in suspect's vehicle.
- #12. Swabs from rear seat.
- #13. Hair, fur and dirt from suspect's vehicle.
- #14 and #15. Hair from floor of suspect's vehicle.
- #16. Victim's jacket.
- #17. Victim's pants.
- #18. Suspect's jacket.
- #19. Victim's boots.
- #20. Victim's known hair.
- #21. Red fibers from suspect's vehicle.
- #22. Red fibers from victim's pants.

Results:

No hairs were found from the vehicle that were the same as the victim's known head hair.

No fibers were found on the victim's clothing that were the same as fibers from the vehicle.

No blood or other significant stains were identified on the swabs.

- #1 Dirt from parking lot near body. Debris contains broken glass, small stones, soil and tobacco fragments. Nothing of known significance was found.
- #2 Dirt from under body. This debris consists primarily of vegetation presumably native to the area and is not unique in character. Blue wool fibers similar to those from the blanket used to cover the body (#15) are present.
- #3 Dirt found near body. This debris contains common vegetation, soil, broken glass, white rodent hairs, black rodent hairs and one human head hair approximately 3 inches in length, wavy and brown in color. No other hairs were found in other submitted items that correspond to this hair and its presence is not likely to be significant.
- #4 Small hand towel. No blood stains or characteristic fibers or hairs were found.
- #5 Blue parka with hood. This jacket shows normal soiling from wear on both the outer surfaces and inside neck area. Blood stains are present on the hooded portion.
- #6 Blue jeans. The jeans are in good clean condition with the exception of stained areas on the right rear and right leg. It seems probable that this is a mixture of dirt and oil from the parking lot where the body was found. Trace evidence includes red fibers that correspond to known red fibers from the American Legion Hall, white wool, red wool, two short yellow synthetic fibers, one yellow/gold synthetic fiber, blue wool, one human head hair 2 3/4 inches long, rodent hairs and dog hairs. The trace evidence is of questionable value. Rodent hairs are not only common and of wide distribution but are known to be present at the site where the body was found. The dog hairs are very similar to dog hairs on the blanket used to cover the body and certainly this is a possible source of the hairs on the clothing, especially since relatively few were found. White wool fibers are common and many are present on the blanket. This blanket is also the probable source of the blue wool and may very well be the source of any of the foreign fibers and hairs recovered from the clothing.
- #7 Black belt. This was intact and in the normal position on the jeans.
- #8 Black rubber boots. The upper portion of the boots is clean with soil present on the soles. A small smear of blue paint is present on the left boot. This has the characteristics of a decorative type paint and its origin is as yet unaccounted for. The location and small amount do not suggest a highly probative value.

- #10 The socks show normal wear since washing as indicated by both their appearance and body odor.
- #11 Underpants. Urine and fecal stains are present. The condition of the underpants (disregarding the fecal and urine stains) is consistent with their having been worn for a relatively extended period of time. No semen was found.
- #12 T-shirt. The T-shirt is soiled and suggests considerable wear since washing. Both the stained and soiled appearance and the presence of perspiration odor support this contention. Blood stains are present.
- #13 Red sweat shirt. The sweat shirt, like the jeans, is clean, in contrast to the undergarments. No body odor or significant staining is present. There is a small amount of blood present at the neck.

* It is unfortunate that the dirt and debris samples from the parking lot and the blanket used to cover the body were not made available to the Laboratory until May, 1977. It would have been particularly useful to know that a dirty blanket had been used to cover the body and that this blanket is a probable source of trace evidence present on the clothing.
