Jumped in Car-

Ms. Simpson told police she was approached as she sat in her car by a man with a bluesteel pistol who told her: "Move over and shut up or I'll kill you. Don't cry or yell or I'm going to give it to you."

She said she was forced to the floor of the car and tied with plastic straps sometimes used instead of handcuffs.

The man said he was writing a book, and asked why she would allow something like a kidnapping to happen, she said.

He drove back into the lot, cut the straps and walked away.

Officers said they spotted Schaefe, still in the parking lot, based on Ms. Simpson's detailed description. His hands were shaking and he volunteered to hand over his revolver, police said.

Veteran Trooper-

Schaefe has worked with the state police criminal investigation section since 1968.

State police officials said late Saturday they relieved Schaefe of his duties but he had not been formally suspended.

Schaefe stood mute Saturday at his arraignment, and Magistrate Jeffrey Faintuck entered a plea of innocent for him. If convicted, Schaefe could be sentenced to life in prison.
