LT. KALBFLEISCH transported Douglas Wilson, of _____, Troy D.O.B. _____ to the offices of Dr. Rossi for the purposes of being interviewed under hypnosis. Doug Wilson had related to friends that he believed he was there the night Tim King was taken to Chatham market. That he remembered seeing a young boy on a skate board. That he remembered an individual sitting in the car watching the children and at the time he observed the young boy and his skate board another individual somewhat resembling the composite was standing by Chatham market watching the boy. Under hypnosis Doug Wilson indicated that he parked his vehicle, a red Alfa Romeo, at the rear of Chatham market. That he observed a young boy going down the parking lot grade riding a skate board. The boy appeared to be around 7 or 8 years of age. He was very small. That he observed the boy jump off the skate board as he approached the back wall of Chatham market and the skate board had run into the wall. He related he was quite a distance from the young man but he believed he was wearing gym shoes, possibly blue pants. Further indicated he remembered a jacket and something about stripes. Due to the size of Tim, the fact he was wearing dark green pants, which could be confused at a distance with blue and that the red jacket he was wearing did have stripes on the sleeves, there is a possibility he did observe go down and run into the back of the building. He stated at this point he saw another white male, approximately 30 years of age, 5' 10" to 6' 0" with dark hair going to the nap of the neck and partially covering the ears with dark eyebrows, wearing casual clothes, but could only remember the jacket which he described as a brown jacket, light weight with smooth finish, possibly a wind breaker watching the boy. He stated at that time he felt it might be the boys father watching his son on the skate board and paid no further attention to this individual. He further stated during the interview and reiterated under hypnosis that after locking his own personal car he observed a man in another car who appeared to be watching the children. Under hypnosis he stated the car was not a Chrysler product, it was American made, that he got the impression it was a Cutless, that being the intermediate Oldsmobile, that it was one color and he could not

was watching. Douglas stated that he had observed the license number and made up a little jingle to remember it, but once leaving the supermarket seeing no damage to his car he dismissed the number. Under hypnosis he gave two possible licenses. One being GBR-222, which he indicated would be GERBER 222 would be the jingle to remember that number. Under further interrogation he came up with the license number GJR-222. After the interview, both numbers were checked by LEIN. License GBR-222 registers on a '69 Ford 2 dr. to Hazel Bradfeld, _____ in Flint. License # GJR-222 registers on a '70 Plymouth 2 dr. to Hilda E. Cook, _____ Otsego. Due to time limitations the attempt for further description of the man in the car and the man near the wall that the young lad was seen with were not completed. Arrangements have been made for another interview on June 9th at 9:00 AM with Dr. Rossi and Trooper Powell will be present to attempt to get an artist's conception of the two subjects. Sgt. Krease is running alterations of the license numbers through the Secretary of State to determine if any meet the description given by witness Douglas Wilson.

June 9, 1977

Douglas Wilson was again put under hypnosis by Dr. Rossi and drawings were made of the two men he saw in the Chatham parking lot on the night in question. The drawings were made by Sgt. Powell of the MSP. Wilson also stated that he had no reason to believe that the two men were together except his own feeling that two persons were involved in the child abductions. RIVARD: Do you want to relate the events that lead up to you being here as it pertained to the situation last night. Give us a resume of what transpired.

McBRIDE: I had an apartment down in Detroit, 122 W. Willis, and I stay there on weekends usually with my wife, and _____ with my sister's, that is the address that I gave you there in Swartz Creek.

RIVARD: What is your sister's name?

McBRIDE: DELORES ANN CONROY, which is more convenient because I work at Chevrolet on Bristol and Van Slyke. This week I took a bus down because my car wasn't running, and why I don't know. It is the first time that I brought that pistol down with me. I don't know why I did that. I brought it down and last night wife and I had an argument and sounded like it was leading to a divorce, so I was upset. Rather than wait 'til this morning to take the bus home, I just rushed out more or less and started hitch-hiking.

RIVARD: What time was this?

McBRIDE: She checked in (she is in the Halfway House) she has to be home at 11:00 and she checked in about 10 to.

RIVARD: Where is the Halfway House located?

McBRIDE: I think it is 2619 Cass. Or else 2916, I'm not sure. I left the apartment right around midnight and walked on up to where I could catch 75, off Mack Avenue. And started hitch-hiking from there. I got one short ride 2 or 3 miles down where it cut off on 10, he dropped me off there and I caught another one right away that took me out to Rochester (I think), somewhere out there and I walked from there to where the incident took place with the Police Officers.

RIVARD: Where was that at?

McBRIDE: I really don't know. It was on I-75 approximately more than half, maybe 2 miles from that cemetery.

RIVARD: What incident with the officers?

McBRIDE: They stopped and told me that I wasn't supposed to be hitch-hiking on the expressway, which I didn't know. I'd seen them coming down off the ramp hitch-hiking and I thought you got stuck out on the highway, it would be the same thing. He said that he wasn't going to give me a ticket for it but that he would take me down to the ramp and I could hitch-hike off the ramp. Before he could give me a ride, he'd have to shake me down for a weapon. I'm on parole, so it's an automatic bust for having the weapon, illegal weapon at that and I got scared. So I pulled the gun out

and disarmed him.

RIVARD: Why compound the situation?

McBRIDE: Cause I was scared.

RIVARD: Had you been drinking or anything?

McBRIDE: No. I was stone cold sober but I was just scared to death of prison, that's why I'm going to Jackson right now.

RIVARD: And disarmed the one officer?

McBRIDE: Both of 'em.

RIVARD: Were they in the car, were you outside the car, or what?

McBRIDE: One had gotten out, the one on the passengers side, and I had him drop the gunbelt and all and he kept stalling and stalling and I think now that they were using the radio. I got the driver to come out on the passengers side and I took the pistol out ????? ????? ????? all the clips and stuff. I had them get off to the side and I got in the car and stole the car.

RIVARD: What have you been in prison for?

McBRIDE: I've been in prison several times.

RIVARD: First time?

McBRIDE: California-armed robbery.

RIVARD: How long ago was that?

McBRIDE: 1959.

RIVARD: And how long did you serve?

McBRIDE: About 18 months.

RIVARD: This was for armed robbery, I assume. What type of weapon?

McBRIDE: Pistol.

RIVARD: Served 18 months. Whereabouts??

McBRIDE: I went through quarantine in Chino and I was sent to Solidad, California.

RIVARD: Where are you from originally?

McBRIDE: Flint. I was stationed in California.

RIVARD: When in '69 did this occur?

McBRIDE: '59.

RIVARD: '59? When in '59?

MCBRIDE: I don't the exact date, I think it was November 10 or 11.

RIVARD: In the winter. And then what? The second one.

MCBRIDE: The second was Michigan, strong arm robbery.

RIVARD: When was this?

MCBRIDE: 1962. About August. Between Fenton and Flint.

RIVARD: Next time?

MCBRIDE: The next time. Well, I was involved in some armed robberies and ended up being pleading guilty to a rape charge to get off from under the armed robberies.

RIVARD: When did this occur?

MCBRIDE: It was in 1964. February.

RIVARD: And how long did you serve on this one?

MCBRIDE: 11 years and 7 months.

RIVARD: When did you get out?

MCBRIDE: August 4 of last year in '76.

RIVARD: And you are on parole now and for how long?

MCBRIDE: About two and a half years.

RIVARD: Who is your parole officer?

MCBRIDE: They changed my parole officer, I got JACK M _____ . Used to be THEODORE ANDERSON, B _____ C. HEDRICK.

RIVARD: Parole Officer is BANUS C. HEDRICK, Parole Agent, Bureau of Field Services, Michigan Department of Corrections, 712 Metropolitan Bldg., 432 N. Saginaw, Flint, Michigan 48502. Office tx 234-2685, home tx 233-7093.

Where do you work now, sir?

MCBRIDE: I was working at the Metal Fabricating Plant, Chevrolet, Bristol and Van Slyke. 2nd shift.

RIVARD: Do you have a badge number or do you go by your social security?

MCBRIDE: Go by social security.

RIVARD: .And what is your social security number?

MCBRIDE:

RIVARD: What time do you go into work?

MCBRIDE: It is hardly ever the same. MY regular hours is from 3:00 to 11:30 PM but they often change it. We were supposed to go in this^{check} from 5:00 to 3:30, working 10 hours. We

worked 11 1/2 hours and used to go in 6:30 to 6:30.

RIVARD: Did you work this past Tuesday evening?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: And this would be from 3:00 to 3:30?

MCBRIDE: From 3:00 to 11:30. I only worked Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday last week.

RIVARD: Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

MCBRIDE: Right. And on two days, I've got overtime on it.

RIVARD: We are going back by about the 15, 16, 17, and 18.

MCBRIDE: I'm not sure what the dates are but it's Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday OK, 15, 16, 17, and 18 I worked those days from 3:00 to 11:30 or 1:30. There are two days where I got overtime.

RIVARD: What is your foreman's name?

MCBRIDE: BILL SCHINBARGER, I'm not sure how you spell that last name. My other foreman is AL PARKER.

RIVARD: What department do you work in?

MCBRIDE: Well, my clock number is 983446.

Metal Fabricating Plant at Briston and what? (not Rivards voice)

MCBRIDE: Bristol and Van Slyke.

RIVARD: Is that the one by the expressway?

MCBRIDE: Yes. Right off 75.

Do you know the phone number there? (unknown voice) Answer: No.

RIVARD: What kind of car do you own?

MCBRIDE: '76 Impala. I mean, a '70 Impala.

RIVARD: 1970 Chevrolet, Impala. What color?

MCBRIDE: Dark green, black vinyl top. License #SYL332.

RIVARD: You say you have trouble with it now?

MCBRIDE: Yes, had the rear-end out.

RIVARD: How long has it been out?

MCBRIDE: All week, I guess. Last week.

RIVARD: How do you get to work?

MCBRIDE: My sister was taking me to work.

RIVARD: The car is at her residence now?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: You have no other means of transportation? Answer: No.

RIVARD: And you took the bus down here yesterday?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: What time did you leave up there yesterday?

MCBRIDE: I caught the 7:40 bus, it actually didn't leave there until 7:50.

RIVARD: Out of Flint and right direct to Detroit.

MCBRIDE: Right. They make a stop at Pontiac and Royal Oak.

RIVARD: What time did you meet your wife?

MCBRIDE: I didn't see her 'til about 8:30 Sunday night. She wasn't there at all Saturday.

RIVARD: You came down here Sunday or Saturday?

MCBRIDE: I came down here Saturday morning.

RIVARD: And where did you stay Saturday night?

MCBRIDE: At the apartment.

RIVARD: And you maintain this apartment in Detroit so that you can see your wife?
And where was your wife?

MCBRIDE: She was babysitting.

RIVARD: Did she know you were coming?

MCBRIDE: Yes. A friend of hers had some problems so she had to baby sit.

RIVARD: You say that you raped, were involved in a rape at one time.

MCBRIDE: Sleeping with a married woman and getting caught. I was 23 and she was 29 and had three kids.

RIVARD: She had three kids? Was that a forcful deal?

MCBRIDE: She said it was, but it wasn't.

RIVARD: She hollered "rape", you are telling me, to save her virtuous standing with her husband?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: But you pled guilty to it?

MCBRIDE: I pled guilty to that to get out from under some armed robberies. Prosecutor did an nolo pros in court.

RIVARD: How many armed robberies?

MCBRIDE: Seven.

RIVARD: In what area? Flint area?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: What type of weapon did you use in those robberies.

MCBRIDE: Sawed off shotgun.

RIVARD: What did you hold up?

MCBRIDE: I don't even remember any more.

RIVARD: Gas stations, business places, residences?

MCBRIDE: Business places.

RIVARD: How about sodomy? You ever been in with that?

MCBRIDE: No I haven't.

RIVARD: In prison?

MCBRIDE: No, never.

RIVARD: Did you have any sexual relations with anybody, your wife or anybody else this week-end?

MCBRIDE: (hesitation) No.

RIVARD: Do you travel with anybody down here this week-end that had a car?

MCBRIDE: No.

RIVARD: Stayed right at the apartment?

MCBRIDE: I stayed at the apartment.....

RIVARD: Where did you have the argument with your wife?

MCBRIDE: She came home last night about 8:30, I guess the argument started about 9:00. Lasted about an hour and a half.

RIVARD: What time did you leave?

MCBRIDE: She left a little before 11:00 and I left about midnight.

RIVARD: But she has to be back at the halfway house.

MCBRIDE: At 11:00, yes.

RIVARD: Why is she in that halfway house?

MCBRIDE: Bad checks.

RIVARD: The Michigan State Police at Brighton apprehended you in 1965 for a term of for 15 to 30 years for a sexual assault and rape.

MCBRIDE: That's the one I did 11 years and 7 months on.

RIVARD: Is that the one?

MCBRIDE:down in Columbia, Missouri then.

RIVARD: Columbia, Missouri.

MCBRIDE: She's a third or fourth cousin.

RIVARD: That's attempt sexual assault and sodomy.

MCBRIDE: Sodomy?!

RIVARD: That's what it says here.

MCBRIDE: It better not.

RIVARD: Sodomy--girl raped. Was it rape at all???

MCBRIDE: There was no penetration of any kind. Just molesting a minor, is what the charge was.

RIVARD: When did you get out of that one?

MCBRIDE: They gave me a year in the county jail and because our stories were so close, he knew we were fibbing about getting married. We were sitting out in the car, parked, necking and got carried a little too far and she got scared and told her mother and her mother and dad are the ones who pressed rape charges. When they got her down and had her examined she was still stone a virgin. She had never been penetrated at any time. She lacked about three months of being 18.

RIVARD: What day did you say you were paroled?

MCBRIDE: August 4th.

Where have you been since your parole? (unknown voice)

MCBRIDE: Flint.

RIVARD: Did you take off from prison at one time?

MCBRIDE: Ya, I tried to. Marquette.

RIVARD: When was that?

MCBRIDE: About '72, I think.

RIVARD: How far did you get?

MCBRIDE: Not very far, not in that area.

RIVARD: Big part of the woods got you, huh?

MCBRIDE: The woods wouldn't have bothered me none, but there was two of us that left and it was during the winter. We were well and we had food and everything. And we were crossing the field and there is a creek that runs through there and we couldn't see it because the snow just leveled right off. He fell through and got wet, so we had to swing back into town and get him dried out. When we started out again, must have been around 10:00 at night or 10:30 and if you know anything about the roads up there, a lot of them

are cut right through the mountains, you got rock, solid rock on both sides. When we come into one of those, we had been staying off the road in the woods, we had to get down on the ground to get through that pass, and about half way through there was a police officer over in Negaunee or Ishpeming, he was a Marquette policeman, he had to _____ been over there in the first place, and he came by and recognized us.

RIVARD: ^{How old is} ~~Where is~~ this girl you were involved down around Missouri?

MCBRIDE: She was 17, almost 18.

RIVARD: You ever have anything to do with little kids?

MCBRIDE: No. That's not my bag.

RIVARD: Then sodomy isn't.

MCBRIDE: Sodomy isn't either. I don't know where they ever got sodomy on that. I'd appreciate it if you'd check on that.

RIVARD: Well, maybe that's the terminology of the charge down there. Looks like it is rather ambiguous here and the fact that it is attempt sexual assault, sodomy, girl, rape it covers all the sins I suppose, everything comes under the same heading

MCBRIDE: Well, I was sentenced for molesting a minor because she wasn't quite 18.

RIVARD: Your definitely working now four nights last week?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: Your car is broke now. Can you use your sister's car?

MCBRIDE: No.

RIVARD: You don't use it or you can't use it?

MCBRIDE: It is extremely rare. They have a new car and they just don't let it go out like that.

RIVARD: What kind of a car do they have? They have a Monte Carlo ? What year?

MCBRIDE: 76 I believe.

RIVARD: What color?

MCBRIDE: Its more of a maroon and white. Maroon bottom and white top.

RIVARD: How far would you have gone on that deal last night?

MCBRIDE: You mean of being resisted?

RIVARD: Yes.

MCBRIDE: That had been it. He have taken the gun away from me _____ But he didn't know that. I'm just glad that he was smart and went along with it because he could have got shot accidentally you know if he tried and struggled with my gun.

RIVARD: You would have struggled though?

MCBRIDE: Not that I would but in the process of taking it away from me he could have got shot because the _____ was back.

RIVARD: He had it cocked.

MCBRIDE: Yes. I wouldn't have pulled the trigger on him.

RIVARD: Did you buy the gun?

MCBRIDE: Yes..

RIVARD: What did you pay for it?

MCBRIDE: \$200.00

RIVARD: Is somebody you know you got it from ?

MCBRIDE: I won't answer.

RIVARD: I _____

MCBRIDE: I don't want to be uncooperative but I don't want to go.

RIVARD: What time did you leave the car?

MCBRIDE: I have no idea.

RIVARD: Well did you stay in the tree all the time?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: See anybody looking for you?

MCBRIDE: I saw _____

RIVARD: How high up in that tree were you?

MCBRIDE: Almost to the top.

RIVARD: About how far off the ground?

MCBRIDE: Thirty-five or forty feet.

RIVARD: Pine tree?

MCBRIDE: Good thirty-five feet. The helicopter come over and hit me twice with the light.

RIVARD: Yes, let's see the scratch on your leg or what have you. How bad is it?

MCBRIDE: It's not that bad.

RIVARD: You say you've got a little one your stomach or something?

MCBRIDE: Well it's actually on the side.

RIVARD: Barbwire?

MCBRIDE: I'm not sure whether that was barbwire when I was going up the tree.

(STEARNS OR DEETZ): At any rate that's your blood on the shorts.

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: Okay we'll contact the people that you worked for

RIVARD: You ever pick any girls up hitchhiking up and down I-75?

MCBRIDE: No.

RIVARD: Or pick up any hitchhikers from your travel up and down I-75?

MCBRIDE: I very rarely pass up a hitchhiker.

RIVARD: You usually pick them up regardless of their age?

MCBRIDE: I wouldn't think I would want to be picking up young kids. The only ones I've ever seen out there are what you call hippies. Anywhere from 18 to 25.

RIVARD: How about young girls?

MCBRIDE: I've never seen any.

RIVARD: 13,14,12. Ever see girls?

RIVARD: Do you have any odd sex habits? Anything you might call kinky or bazaar?

MCBRIDE: No.

RIVARD: Into bondage?

MCBRIDE: No

RIVARD: You know what that is?

MCBRIDE: Yes.

MCBRIDE: Yes.

RIVARD: By a Troy Police Officer.

RIVARD: And that was prior to this interview.
